Different circumstances in life create situations where people may find that they must temporarily or permanently use a wheelchair, walker or other assistive devices that require specific dimensional characteristics and features in the homes they buy. The Accessible Home Checklist is for homeowners who are selling to fill out to highlight the accessibility features in their home. It is also handy for planning in making an assessment of the home when planning an accessible remodel. This will be helpful for those seeking or renovating homes to accommodate a person using a wheelchair or persons with other disabilities. Buyers will be looking for homes that can accommodate their needs as is as well as properties that can be modified and enhanced to accomplish that end.
